believe him.

He is not God here. He was God at Midwest Academy. He wasn't questioned at Midwest Academy. Everybody took what he said no matter what.

You now have the power and the control. Use it to seek the truth, use it to do justice and find him guilty, guilty on each and every count.

Thank you.

(The Court read the remaining jury instructions to the jury.)

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, I don't believe you have the verdict form attached to your copies. However, it's pretty straightforward. Count I is the Sexual Abuse offense. On the second page is the Pattern, Practice, or Scheme, and on the third page is the Child Endangerment. On each of those counts, you have to have—that's where you need to enter your verdict, okay? So they're separated by page and each goes by Count I, Count II, Count III. It's pretty straightforward once you get a chance to

look at it.

You will have copies of the jury instructions. You have a bunch of those. The originals will have my signature line and also the verdict forms attached. I'll have it put together with this green clip. So you might want to keep that one separate, okay?

Ms. and Ms. you are the alternates in this case. You won't take part in the deliberations. However, I would ask that you abide by the admonition not to speak or communicate about the case until such time as a verdict is rendered in this case. You can call the Clerk's office tomorrow and see if a verdict was entered.

And, again, your service in this case was very much appreciated.

Alternates are used very often. The last case I had two months ago--or less than a month ago, we lost two so we had to use the alternates in that. So again, it was a very valuable service. I was somewhat surprised that we didn't lose anybody over

two weeks because often that happens because of illness and so forth.

So we really appreciate your service. Without your service, it really would have been very difficult to go forward in this case.

(The court attendant was given an oath by the Court.)

THE COURT: Ladies and gentlemen, we'll plan on going until about, again, the same schedule, 4:30 to 5:00. If for some reason you want to stay a little bit longer, that's fine.

I have to give you instructions on how--plan on coming back tomorrow about 8:30 in the morning. I have to give you instructions on that. As you can see, the roofing people here are opening and closing doors. If I got my directions correctly, the Blondeau door, which has been closed, will now be open, I think. This door (indicating) will be shut. I think I'm going the right direction. That will be closed off for construction.

The second issue is that it's a

1 county holiday tomorrow but not a State holiday. So the county offices are 2 3 closed, and we've been asked to basically keep all the doors locked, just letting 5 people in and out as we go. So we'll deal with that at the close of the day, but there will be a little bit of 7 8 complications there. 9 With that you can begin your 10

deliberations.

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(The jury began deliberations at 3:43 p.m.)

(In open court, outside the presence of the jury, in the presence of the Court, the Defendant, and counsel at 4:45 p.m.)

THE COURT: The record shall reflect all counsel are present and the Defendant. We're at about a quarter to 5:00. The jury informed the court attendant that they wish to adjourn for today and come back tomorrow morning, and we'll just bring them in.

I need to give some instructions to the rest of you. I think I've told a lot

of the press but, again, tomorrow is a 1 2 county holiday. The doors will be locked. 3 So if someone needs to get in, the people, the other people interested also need to 5 call the Clerk's office and they can let 6 you in. Someone in the Clerk's office 7 will come down and let you in, all right? 8 You can bring in the jury. 9 (In open court, in the presence of 10 the jury, the Court, the Defendant, and 11 counsel at 4:48 p.m.)

THE COURT: Please be seated everyone.

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The Court was informed by Ms.

that you wish to come back

tomorrow morning. So would 8:30 work for all of you?

(All jurors responded in the affirmative.)

THE COURT: All right, 8:30.

Remember what I said, somebody from the Clerk's office is going to start being down there about 8:15 tomorrow morning at the Blondeau door, so they will let you in until we get all 12 of you in. Then they

will lock it back up again. This is a county building. We just use the facilities. So that's why we have to do it.

A couple of other things. If for some reason someone gets locked out or anything else, call the Clerk's office because the State offices are open tomorrow and tell them you're locked out, or if you don't know which door to go to or something like that. If something like that happens, call the Clerk's office, the South Lee County Clerk's Office, and they will let you know or tell you where to go.

Remember, just keep an open mind.

Deliberate the case in there, not anywhere else. All right. Have a good evening.

(A recess was taken at 4:50 p.m. on December 21, 2017, to reconvene at 8:30 a.m. on December 22, 2017.)

(In open court, outside the presence of the jury, in the presence of the Court, the Defendant, and counsel at 10:20 a.m. on December 22, 2017.)

THE COURT: Please be seated

everyone. The record shall reflect that Ms. Timmins appears for the State and Ms. Schaefer appears with the Defendant.

The Court has been informed a verdict has been reached in this case.

Before bringing the jury in to announce the verdict, I just want to remind—and I understand this has been an emotional case for both sides. I don't want any emotional outbursts or anything like that, talking, or anything when the verdict is read. I understand that might be a problem for some people. If it is, have a seat outside the courtroom or just wait outside the courtroom, okay?

The other thing, ladies and gentlemen, after the verdict is read and announced, give the jury a chance to leave before anyone in the courtroom is allowed to leave because there's only one hallway out of there. After that that they can do what they want, but I want to give them the opportunity to leave first if they choose to do so.

You may bring in the jury.

With that, thank you very much for your service. You are released from your prior admonition. You are free to go.

Everyone will stay in the courtroom until you've had a chance to go get your belongings and leave the courthouse if you wish. After that you can do what you want, okay?

I can't go into any questions about your verdict in this case. But if any of you--I'll be here for a while yet, but if any of you have any questions of a general nature regarding your service in this case, and particularly were you

comfortable, were you treated with respect, anything like that. I'd like to have your feedback because that's important for future cases.

So if any of you felt you weren't respected properly, scheduling, uncomfortable, anything, I'll be around and I'd be glad to take any responses or any suggestions you have, okay?

MS. TIMMINS: Judge, excuse me.

Could you let the jury know that they can speak with the parties, too, if they want?

THE COURT: Again, you can speak with the parties if you wish. You don't have to. Don't feel pressured. You can just say no if you want or you can say yes. Whatever you want to do. Sometimes they send out questionnaires regarding general questions, what can we do to make it better, things like that. You're under absolutely no obligation to respond to those questions. That's totally your decision. Don't think you're under any pressure to do so, okay?

All right. With that, thank you

very much for your service.

(The jury was excused at 10:30 a.m.)

(In open court, in the presence of the Court, the Defendant, and counsel at 10:31 a.m.)

THE COURT: Please be seated everyone.

The jury has now left. Based on the verdicts reached in this case, the Defendant will stand convicted in Count I of the lesser included offense of Assault With Intent to Commit Sexual Abuse, in violation of Iowa Code Section 709.11 of the Code of Iowa.

He will stand convicted in Count II of Pattern, Practice, or Scheme to Engage in Sexual Exploitation by a Counselor or Therapist as charged in the Trial Information in Count II.

He's found convicted of the charge of Child Endangerment in Count III as charged in the Trial Information, which would be an aggravated misdemeanor.

Prior to sentencing the Court will

1 order that a presentence investigation 2 report be completed in this case. I'll 3 set a sentencing date approximately eight weeks from today's date. I'll check the schedule with Court Administration before 6 that. However, we'll try and get that 7 today. It will be about eight weeks from 8 today. 9 The Defendant needs to report to 10 the Department of Correctional Services 11 within five days to make arrangements to 12 complete the presentence investigation. 13 Is there anything else, Ms. 14 Timmins, regarding the record? 15 MS. TIMMINS: No, Your Honor. 16 THE COURT: Ms. Schaefer? 17 MS. SCHAEFER: No, Your Honor. 18 THE COURT: All right. That will 19 conclude the proceedings here today, and 20 we'll get that date as soon as we can. 21 (The proceedings concluded at 10:35 22 a.m. on December 22, 2017.)
