Greetings from Midwest Academy!

Midwest Academy is a private therapeutic boarding school located on a secluded 70 acres in the Tri-State area of Illinois, Iowa, and Missouri. It is a self contained facility, which has, dormitories, gymnasium, seminar room, library, cafeteria, classrooms, and recreational space. The Academy offers a highly structured environment where students can progress both academically and personally, developing proper motivation and self-direction.

Midwest Academy utilizes a merit model for tracking student progress. A student will begin with basic privileges and through good behavior, academics, and leadership, will earn merits to move forward in their program. We have six status levels that students must complete in order to graduate the program. The first three statuses are for students to understand the need for rules and boundaries. The fourth status is focused on being in service to others and the final statuses, levels 5 and 6, expand upon application of the skills and tools that the students have learned while transitioning into the home environment. The character building program is designed to take anywhere from eleven to fourteen months.

Academically, the Academy uses a self-paced curriculum. The curriculum we provide is designed to offer an atmosphere that fosters accelerated learning away from the many distractions of the typical high school setting. Students enrolled in our school do not have the distraction of the opposite sex in the same classroom. Class, meals, activities, and dorm rooms remain completely separate to provide an environment where students can focus on themselves personally and academically. Coed activities and workshops are offered to students to deal with these issues under high supervision.

Midwest Academy provides a series of high impact educational seminars and workshops specifically designed to teach character building. During these seminars, students learn about key qualities such as: accountability, honesty, integrity, trust, choices, responsibility, anger, and self-esteem. While the students are completing their set of seminars, we invite parents to attend similar seminars located on the Midwest Academy campus. The parent seminars offer the opportunity to experience first hand some of the valuable tools that our students are learning. While most parents find the seminars of great personal value, the real value is that it provides greater bonding, insight, and understanding by participating in a common experience. Parent participation is critical in building the foundation for the relationship families deserve and desire.

In addition to the parent seminars we also assist parents in building a strong support network. The Adopt a Parent program aligns new families with a veteran family who can assist them if they have questions or want to share with another family's experience. A private Facebook group is sponsored by alumni parents in order to remain connected and there are a couple of regional support groups which monthly to provide additional support.

Midwest Academy has an open door policy. We offer the opportunity for parents to visit with staff or take a campus tour at anytime.



Key Points to Remember

Midwest Academy is private boarding school that accepts and houses both male and female students. Students are separated and only participate in coed activities under high supervision.

➤ Level System:

Levels earned based on points earned for good behavior and academic progress.

Level 1: New students, First level

Level 2: Automatically earned when a student earns 200 points. Privileges gained on this level are access to the salad bar and candy bar snacks on Saturday.

Level 3: Student must reach 1000 points, meet the level 3 standards, and be an Elements I seminar graduate. At this level a student earns two phone calls per month, one on site activity per month, and the opportunity to serve as bunk leader or dorm leader to earn additional points.

Level 4: Student must reach 2400 points, meet the level 4 standards, and be an Elements II seminar graduate. At this level a student earns three phone calls per month, 2 on site activities per month, and one off ground visit with family per month, and other such upper level privileges such as: makeup, jewelry, music, free time, and less supervision.

Level 5: Student must reach 1600 points, meet the level 5 standards, and be a Principals graduate. At this level a student earns weekly phone calls, an overnight off ground visit, two on or off site activities per month, upper level privileges, and the opportunity to move into an Internalization room. Intern rooms are separate from dorm rooms, are limited to 3 or 4 students, and set up as a college dorm setting. Students have access to more personal items, less supervision, and later bed times.

Level 6: Student must reach 1600 points, meet level 6 standards, and be a PW2 graduate. At this level a student earns weekly phone calls, one 5-7 day home visit per month, two on or off grounds activities per month, and all upper level privileges already earned. Students now begin the Home Transition Phase of the program.

*We are a results based program; students have to be creating the results to vote up for their levels. This is based on a support/deny process within the school consisting of: staff, administration, academics, peer, and student council support.

> Supervision:

Levels 1-3 are always supervised. They work in groups of 12-18 students per one dorm staff and a family rep. Dorm staff is responsible for keeping students on task, working through their schedule, and issuing consequences when needed. Levels 4-6 utilize the buddy system. These are students that have earned a certain level of trust and are showing positive results. They do not require constant supervision but do have to have a student buddy with them at all times and be able to account for where they are going or where they have been.

> Therapy:

Individual, group therapy, and psychiatric services are offered to Midwest Academy students. Therapists not only have the opportunity to meet with students one on one but have the unique ability to observe them in their daily routine and peer environment. Information for our treatment team is listed below.

> Family Representatives

Each student is also assigned a family representative to work with them individually in addition to working with their family. Family representatives hold varying degrees or trainings. All Family Representatives have completed the Elements and Parent/Child Workshops hosted by Midwest Academy.

Communication:

Initially communication with the student will only be through weekly letters. At level 3 a student is eligible for two phone calls a month, a level 4 is eligible for three phone calls and an off ground visit per month, at level 5 a student is eligible for 3 phone calls per month and one off ground overnight visit, and at level 6 a student is eligible for weekly phone calls and a weeklong home pass monthly or they will be working through a home transition program.

Communication with a family representative during this time will remain weekly through phone calls and e-mail.

> Seminars:

Our highly dynamic student and family seminars are the core foundation for our character building program. They are designed to help identify student struggles and causes, provide the space and tools heal those internal conflicts, and to provide the time and practice to learn and incorporate new and healthy habits. Our seminars are experiential hands on training that will give students and their families the opportunity to learn new communication and coping skills in an environment facilitated by professional staff. Students will actively participate in this hand on experience to gain a true understanding of the principals taught and will meet weekly between sessions to continue practice the skills taught. There are several seminars that students must complete in order to graduate the program. They are: Accountability, Elements I, Elements II, Value Living (3 mini one day seminars), and Parent and Child Workshops I, II, and III. In addition to student participation in seminars, we also require parent involvement. Parent participation will set the bar for the work a student will do. Parent involvement will focus on identification of family values, learning how to open lines of communication, teaching parents how to restructure the home environment to aid student development upon transition home, and understanding the need for loving but consistent parenting. Parents are personally required to attend Elements I and II in addition to attending Parent and Child Workshops I, II, and III.

> Academics:

Midwest Academy has a progressive academic curriculum that is individualized and competency based. This allows students to work at their pace to maximize the learning process. Students are not held back by others in class, by teacher lesson plans, schedules, or course offerings. This allows students the opportunity to move at an accelerated rate if they put forth the effort.

The courses at Midwest Academy are provided on computers using a state of the art curriculum that includes interactive features, graphs, illustrations, and other multimedia teaching. Some classes are taught in a lecture type setting in conjunction with the computer course work. Those classes include: Oral Communications, Creative Writing, Music, Choir, Art, Spanish, French and a few varied electives. All courses are performance based; students only receive credits when they have demonstrated that they have mastered the material. We require students to maintain a minimum B average.

Activities:

Students are awarded activities as they move forward in their program. Activities are planned on a monthly basis and include: pizza parties, movies, BBQ's, painting, makeover parties, video game competitions, and much more. Level 4-6 students may leave facility grounds for activities such as: shopping, amusement parks, movies, bowling, dinner, swimming, golfing, etc.

Midwest Academy also promotes service projects as a chance for students to volunteer and give back to the community. Such projects have included a day of cleaning up after community events, handing out candy for the Keokuk Police Department during Halloween, painting a city park, visiting nursing homes, and assisting at other community events when requested. This not only offers students a chance to BE in service but it also assists them to integrate back into public settings.

For students who meet the requirement and have the ability, there are opportunities to participate in sports at the local high school. We have had Midwest athletes participate in volleyball, basketball, football, track, cross country track, and baseball. Keokuk High School/Midwest Academy students were the Iowa State Football Champs in 2007.

> Parent Support:

Midwest Academy believes in family. We are a program designed not only to assist students through struggles, but are here to redirect and support their family as well. We have a number of programs created to support new families and to assist them in getting involved.

The Parent Support Association, or PSA, is an organization of parents collectively working together to generate ideas, host various activities, and assist with fundraising efforts throughout the year. This helps parents to stay engaged in special activities which will benefit their child.

We also have a few support groups across, in addition to a Private Facebook Support Group page, and small group calls for parents. We have learned that the most successful families are the ones that put themselves out there and do the work!

> Zero Tolerance Policy:

Midwest Academy has a zero tolerance policy against acts of violence and physical aggression as well as other dangerous, severely disruptive, or extremely defiant behavior exhibited by any student.

These behaviors will not be tolerated for the following reasons: endangers staff, students, and the school, it distracts and significantly impedes the progress of others, it is destructive to the general environment and positive peer culture, it consumes staff time and attention, allows negative role models to make impressions on new students, and it influences other students to misbehave or act out.

Midwest Academy reserves the right to expel any student that exhibits this type of behavior. If student is expelled, parents will be given advance notice and Midwest Academy will do all we can to assist parents in finding a working alternative.

Our admission process eliminates the acceptance of students who meet this type of criteria. Midwest Academy expulsion rate is less than 1%.

Treatment Team at Midwest Academy

The services of a Clinical Social Worker, licensed professional Social workers, and Certified Reciprocal Alcohol and Drug Counselors are available on campus to the students of Midwest Academy.

Mr. Mike Davis has Associates in Social Work from Ricks College in Idaho, Bachelors in Social Work from Brigham Young University, and Masters in Clinical Social Work from University of Utah Graduate School of Social Work. Mike is a Licensed Independent Social Worker in Iowa, a license equal to a Clinical Social Worker License in other states. He has over 20 years experience providing psychotherapy to children, young adults, individuals, couples, and through family counseling.

The *Anger Management* group involves guided discussions and exercises on topics such as understanding anger, emergency anger control, healthy versus unhealthy anger, anger types, the role anger plays in society and families, learning how to decline invitations to anger, creating coping thoughts, plus relaxation and stress reduction techniques. This group meets weekly for approximately 8 weeks.

The *Adoption Group* provides those students with an opportunity to talk through their unique issues with other adopted youth in a facilitated setting. Topics include establishing a sense of personal identity, working through feelings of rejection or abandonment, dealing with sibling rivalry, coping with life's milestones and "special" days, and searching for biological family. This group does not have a specified length.

The *Emotional Literacy* is geared toward improving the student's ability to recognize and understand the emotions which are behind their perceptions, choices, and feelings in order to promote more constructive behavior. Topics include risky behavior, friends, trust, accountability, forgiveness of self and others and preparing for the future.

Mr. Gary LaChapelle is a Certified Reciprocal Alcohol and Drug Counselor and has a B.A., M.A. in Psychology. He has earned his education through Southeastern Community College, Jacksonville University, Auburn University, and California Coast University. Gary has had 21 years of experience working in the public sector prior to joining the staff at Midwest Academy in June of 2004.

Mr. LaChapelle provides individual counseling in addition to hosting chemical dependency groups.

The *Chemical Dependency* group focuses on the total person. The students work on many issues from the 12 step program in addition to other topics such as relapse prevention, choices and change, feelings, anger issues, avoiding risky behaviors, balancing lifestyle, recovery maintenance, coping skills, decision making skills, and much more. Most students will normally receive between 75 and 80 hours of chemical dependency counseling while at Midwest Academy.

Ms. Jane Riter has a Bachelors in Psychology and a Masters in Counseling Education from Western Illinois University and is a licensed mental health counselor in the state of Iowa and Illinois. Jane has 19 years of experience in providing mental health treatment for children, adolescents, adults, couples and families. Jane utilizes play therapy techniques with children and adolescents and is experienced with providing care to traumatized victims and their families. She has experience with substance abuse support groups for males and females, residential treatment for chronically mentally ill individuals and adolescents and in-home family services for children and their families.

Shasta Heidbreder has an Associates in Applied Science and a BA in Psychology from Penn Foster College and is a licensed Chemical Dependency Alcohol Counselor in the State of Iowa. Shasta is also a certified CPI Instructor trained through the Crisis Prevention Institute. She provides regular non violent crisis prevention training to Midwest Academy employees.

Ms. Callie Peterson has an Associates in Applied Science from Southeastern Community College and is a licensed Chemical Dependency Counselor in the State of Iowa. Callie is finishing her intern hours under the direction of Clinical Director, Mike Davis, and will be licensed as a Chemical Dependency Alcohol Counselor in 2015.

Mrs. Layani Trane graduated from Southern Utah University with her Bachelors in Public Relations and Bachelors in Interpersonal Communications. She graduated from California Coast University with her Masters in Psychology. Mrs. Trane is the wife of Midwest Academy Founder, Ben Trane.

Mr. Ray Forrester completed his internship at Midwest Academy in the summer of 2014. He returned to BYU School of Social Work to finish his Masters degree. We are excited that Ray will be returning with his license in April of 2015.

Psychiatric Services

Midwest Academy contracts TeleHealth services through Seasons Center for Behavioral Health to provide psychiatric evaluation, consultation, and medication management to Midwest Academy students. This service is billed directly to insurance with co payments and any remaining liabilities billed to parents or guardians.

 Janne Johnson, ARNP is the Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner for Midwest Academy through Seasons Center TeleHealth Network.
 Mrs. Johnson has her BSN through Briar Cliff University, Masters of Science in Nursing through Creighton University, and her Post Master's Certificate through Medical University of South Carolina.
 *Ms. Johnson is under direct supervision of several psychiatrists on staff at Seasons Center.

Psychiatric services are also offered through a psychiatrist off campus. Dr. St. Hill meets with students in his office setting to provide evaluations, prescriptions, and medication management. These services are billed directly to insurance with parents being responsible for any co-payments or remaining liabilities not covered by insurance. We also offer the opportunity for students to continue working with their psychiatrist at home through video or teleconferencing. This must be discussed with and agreed to by family psychiatrist prior to enrollment. Providers do not provide full scale psychological assessments.

About the Founder of Midwest Academy

Ben Trane was introduced to work in the adolescent treatment field in the summer of 1996 while working at a facility in St. George, Utah. Ben experienced a process of observing families shift from sick and dysfunctional to whole and healthy. This ignited a passion to be in service to families in need.

Ben attended Southern Utah University and majored in Business and Computer Science. While in college, he helped start Teens in Crisis. Teens in Crisis provided struggling families the necessary resources to identify and locate treatment programs and educational services to meet their family's needs.

Ben also began offering transportation services to provide safe passage for students going into residential care. Through this process he was able to explore various schools and differing philosophies, and gained vast knowledge of what key components created a successful program.

In 2002 Ben ventured east in hopes to find a good central location within the Midwest region to start his own school. He traveled from the upper part of Wisconsin to southern Texas and found a wonderful placed to call home in Keokuk, Iowa. In the spring of 2003, he married his beautiful wife, Layani, and they started Midwest Academy in June that same year.

The school started with humble roots with a few close families working together to launch a small, 10-student program. Midwest Academy grew quickly to over 300 students in the first two years. The student body has fluctuated over the years, leading to the determination that a healthy number of students on campus should remain between 120-150 students. Midwest Academy is one of the largest private therapeutic boarding schools in the country.

Midwest Academy has helped thousands of families since its first student arrived in 2003. During this time Ben has developed a 24-week course on helping individuals and families gain control of their households and personal lives. His dynamic series of personal growth and family seminars are a strong catalyst for change with students and their families. Most students remark that these highly inspired seminars are the most important and memorable part of their healing process.

Ben's family has grown considerably over the years. He and Layani have 7 children, five biological and two adopted. They reside on the school campus and love the interaction the students can have with their family. In essence, students become an extension of the Trane Family. For The Tranes, Midwest Academy isn't a job; it is a lifestyle and a passion to be in service to others.
